INTRODUCTION

Govt. Degree College, Chenani, a co-educational Govt. Institute that aims to nurture student learning, foster faculty research, creative activity and provide service to the larger community.

The foundation of the College was laid on 8th March 2019 at village Tandhar, Tehsil Chenani, Dist. Udhampur, (J&K). A vast area of 97 kanals and 19 Marlas has been set aside for the construction of the College building with all modern and requisite amenities. The first Academic Session of the College began on 19th July 2019 from a building of the School Education Dept., Govt. of J&K and is presently operating from the same building. The College aims to benefit a population of around 45 surrounding villages of the Tehsil Chenani.

Initially, the College began functioning with 10 subjects (Humanities stream) and strength of 106 students. In 2020, (the second subsequent year after inception), the Science stream (with subject combinations in disciplines of Medical, Non-Medical along with a subject of Computer Applications) was added to the curriculum and the strength of the College rose to 268.

The College promotes social & professional responsibility and growth. MAINTENANCE OF CAMPUS INFRASTRUCTURE

- Having adequate infrastructure is not enough for effective institutional functioning, the regular maintenance and upkeep of infrastructure is essential.
- There are effective mechanisms for the upkeep of the infrastructural facilities that promotes the optimum use of the same. Faculty members and non-teaching staff members are designated as Incharge for the different facilities appropriately for which Log and Issue registers are maintained wherever necessary.

CRITERION 1 - CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1. THE INSTITUTION ENSURES EFFECTIVE CURRICULUM DELIVERY THROUGH A WELL PLANNED AND DOCUMENTED PROCESS:

The college regards effective delivery of curriculum as the most vital curricular aspect. The college follows the curriculum prescribed by the University of Jammu through its various Boards of Studies in different subject areas.

The college ensures effective curriculum delivery through systematic and strategic transparent mechanism:

Academic calendar:

• The college follows the Academic calendar issued by the University and Directorate of College Development (CDC) and executes it rigorously.

• The Principal monitors the effective implementation of the Calendar through formal meetings with Faculty members of different Departments and if necessary informal discussions with faculty.

Apart from the regular Academic Calendar, the College maintains its session wise Calendar for Co and Extra-Curricular Activities.

Time- Table Committee:

- The college constitutes the Time Table committee that prepares the Time-Table.
- The Time Tables are displayed on the Notice Board and also uploaded on the college website.

• The syllabus link of University is also provided to the students through the Notice Boards, WhatApp groups and College Website.

Teaching Plan and Teaching Diary:

- Teaching plan is prepared by every faculty member at the beginning of academic year.
- They record the conduct of teaching and practical in the diary.
- Periodic assessment of curriculum delivery is conducted by the Principal.

• The faculty engages extra periods and practicals as and when necessary and maintain their records.

Teaching Aids:

- Methods like seminar, group discussion, quiz, case study for effective delivery of curriculum.
- Study materials, notes, PPTs and question banks are provided in the class and through mails.
- Group projects are assigned to teach them team spirit, sharing and develop presentation, research skills.
- Guest lectures, Expert lectures and Webinars are conducted regularly.

Feedback:

- The College conducted student feedback survey to assess the satisfaction level of students at different times during the past two years.
- Recently, the College has undergone a complete exercise on Student Satisfaction Survey and Student Feedback of the College and its academics through Google Forms. The results of the same shall be shared on the College Website.

Grievance Redressal Cell:

The College has a Grievance Redressal mechanism operating through a committee of faculty members. Also, a Grievance/Suggestion box has been installed on the campus as well as on the College website for any discrepancies to be identified and steps taken for improvement.

The achievements of objectives of the syllabus are measured through students' performance in internal tests, Group discussions, Presentations and University examinations.

Also, a daily attendance report of the teaching faculty (through Google Forms during Online teaching days of Lockdown) and of the Non-teaching staff is maintained.

CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

- ➤ The process of admissions is through a transparent, well-administered mechanism, complying with all the norms of the University.
- Apart from the compliance to the various regulations the institution puts forth all its efforts in ensuring equity and wide access to the students for admissions having representation of student community from different geographical areas and socio-economic, cultural and educational backgrounds.
- The learner-centred education through appropriate methodologies such as participative learning, experiential learning and collaborative learning modes, facilitate effective learning.
- Students are also provided opportunities to develop their creativity by participating in various programs such as group discussions, technical quizzes to develop analytical and problem-solving abilities; various club activities are conducted by all the departments in the respective areas to mould the students in corresponding field.

> COUNSELLING

- The Institute practices a robust student academic counselling process. During the time of admission, the Principal and Faculty interacts with the parents and the student to assess their need and aspirations. Further during the course of study, groups of students are assigned to a faculty for counselling on issues relating to career, placement and other psychological needs.
- The counsellors monitor academic performance and interact frequently to understand and assist any student with issues that affect their ability to learn or impede their academic success.

> SLOW LEARNERS

- Departments conduct remedial classes, provide course notes for students especially the slow learners and those students who are at the verge of dropping out due to stress.
- Such students are given regular class tests in order to improve their performance in the university exam.
- Extra classes are organized to clarify doubts. Critical topics are re-explained for better understanding by the students. Appropriate counselling with additional teaching is done which eventually results in students attending the classes regularly.

CRITERIA 2- TEACHING- LEARNING AND EVALUATION

1. STUDENT CENTRIC METHODS, SUCH AS EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING, PARTICIPATIVE LEARNING AND PROBLEM SOLVING METHODOLOGIES ARE USED FOR ENHANCING LEARNING EXPERIENCES

Teaching-learning methods adopted by the faculty members include Lecture Method, Interactive Method, Project-based Learning, Computer-assisted Learning, Experiential Learning etc. The Teaching – learning activities are made effective through PowerPoint presentations and special lectures.

- Lecture method: This conventional method is commonly adopted by all the teachers, especially language teachers. This method facilitates the teacher to interpret, explain and revise the content of a text only for better understanding of the subject by the learners.
- Interactive method: The faculty members make learning interactive with students by motivating student participation in group discussions, Webinars, subject quiz, news analysis, educational games.
- ICT Enabled Teaching: Virtual class room links the guest lecture of eminent persons to develop their core knowledge in the subject. The institution adopts modern pedagogy in line with emerging trends to enhance teaching-learning process. The institution has the essential equipment to support the faculty members and students.
- Online reference lecture talks, motivational talks, educational videos and web reference support the teaching-learning process. Learning resources and useful websites are made available in the college website, which serve as a ready link to access the portals of information and gain knowledge.
- Group Learning Method: Group Learning allows the slow learners to develop problem solving, interpersonal, presentational and communication skills to confirm quality in learning with Peer Group.
- Research-based Learning: Certain depts. like Sociology, Education, Zoology, Botany, EVS have undertaken certain small research based initiatives wherein the faculty members involve the young students to provide them an insight into critical thinking, logical assessment and analysis.
- Student Seminars/Webinars: The Student seminars are organized where in the papers are presented by students on contemporary topics to enrich their learning experience.

EXTENSION ACTIVITIES

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS): Govt. Degree College, Chenani was allocated a unit of NSS on 5th Jan. 2021and it has come a long way since then with the enrolment of a total of 125 students in the newly established NSS unit '**PRAYATNA**'. The College aims to instil the core values of the **National Service Scheme** in to its apprentices. The College intends to involve its students in a variety of social service and developmental activities concomitantly with the normal academic programme living to the motto of the scheme, Education through Community Service.

The detail of all the Extension and Community Services by the College are given in the two quarterly issues of the NSS Newsletter published by the College from Jan. to Mar. 2021 and from Apr to June 2021.

The College under its NSS unit 'Prayatna' adopted five villages around the town of Chenani on 15th & 16th Feb. 2021 as part of the outreach and extension activity. The village adoption and development programme was intended to be executed under the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan of MHRD, Govt. of India, inspired by the vision of transformational change in rural development processes by leveraging knowledge institutions to help build the architecture of an Inclusive India. The college has taken the initiative to provide an opportunity to the students to understand the factors that are responsible for under-development in a village, despite plethora of programmes and schemes in vogue. The college shall try to get familiar with various intervention programs, understanding of the prevailing situation, mobilization of community, initiation of the participatory process, establishing linkages among line departments etc. which are likely to strengthen the process of development and ensure poverty reduction and strengthening of natural resources management as a participating institute in UBA.

The five villages adopted by the College include Champeri, Ghantwal, Baisht, Bain and Bashti.

The College has also undertaken many programs under Swachh Bharat, AIDs awareness, Gender issue, Gandhian thoughts. The detail is presented in the ANNUAL COLLEGE MAGAZINE 'REFLECTIONS' from 2019-2020.

LIBRARY AS A RESOURCE

The college library is the foundation of college education. It is the hub of college education around which all academic activities revolve. The Library aims at providing necessary information and making them available to all beneficiaries in the appropriate time. The Library supports the academic community in carrying out teaching learning and research activities to the extent within the financial constraints. In Order to inculcate the habit of reading amongst the students, the college has a well-stocked library and well-furnished reading room. All the students, the faculty members and the non-teaching staff have an access to the books and the reading room. The college library has a large collection of books ranging from encyclopedias to fiction, text books to reference books, general awareness to competitive books.

The college library is in the process of building up but has acquired a rich collection pertaining to different fields viz; medical, non- medical, Arts, humanities etc. The total collection of the library is **6348** which comprises of text books, references, periodicals, magazines of different disciplines like General English, English Literature, Education, Political Science, Sociology, Zoology, Botany, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Computer Application, Mathematics, Physics, Urdu, Geography, Hindi and Dogri Library Services

> THERE ARE ESTABLISHED SYSTEMS AND PROCEDURES FOR MAINTAINING AND UTILIZING PHYSICAL, ACADEMIC AND SUPPORT FACILITIES -LABORATORY, LIBRARY, SPORTS COMPLEX, COMPUTERS, CLASS ROOMS ETC.

The college ensures optimal utilization of the available financial recourses for maintenance and upkeep of different facilities by holding regular meetings of various committees constituted for this purpose and using the grants received by the college as per the requirements in the interest of students.

Laboratory: Record of maintenance account is maintained by the lab In charge and supervised by HODs of the concerned departments.

Library: The requirement and list of books is taken from the concerned departments and HODs are involved in the process. The finalized list of required books is duly approved and signed by the Principal.

To ensure return of books, 'no dues' from the library is mandatory for students before appearing in exam.

Other issues such as schedule of issue/ return of books etc. are chalked out / resolved by the library committee.

Sports: Regarding the maintenance of sports equipment the college sports in charge is deputed.

Classrooms: The College has various committees for maintenance and upkeep of infrastructure and LED panels/Smart boards in the class rooms. At the departmental level, HODs submit their requirements to the Principal regarding classroom furniture and other requirements.

Proper Log registers are maintained for the usage of each facility in the College including Computer Lab, Browsing Centre, Class rooms, Gymnasium, Indoor games etc.

ADDITIONALLY:

1. There are lab in charges for every department, who maintain the stock register by physically verifying the items round the year.

2. Department wise annual stock verification is done by the committee constituted for the purpose.

3. Regular maintenance of Computer Laboratory equipment is done by the faculty in charge.

4. Regular cleaning of water tanks, wash rooms and other spaces is a routine.

5. College campus maintenance is monitored through regular inspection.



CODE OF CONDUCT
